1. EARLI 2019 conference

The 18th EARLI Biennial Conference will take place from August 12th-16th 2019 and will be hosted by the RWTH Aachen University. The theme of the conference is Thinking Tomorrow's Education: Learning from the past, in the present and for the future.

On behalf of SIG 20, we warmly encourage you to submit a proposal for EARLI and/or JURE 2019: Make sure to submit your proposal before the submission deadline expires October 30th midnight CET!

2. Highlights from the SIG20/26 conference 2018

The Joint 2018 conference of the EARLI Special Interest Groups 20 ("Inquiry Learning") and 26 ("Argumentation, Dialogue and Reasoning"), took place successfully at Jerusalem, from October 9th to October 12th, and was hosted by the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. The conference was organized by the local organizing committee (Christa Asterhan, Baruch Schwarz, Edith Bouton, Yifat Kolikant, Efrat Firer) in collaboration with the international organizing committee (On behalf of SIG 26: Baruch Schwarz, Armin Weinberger, & Freydis Vogel / On behalf of SIG20: Bram De Wever, Ingo Kollar, & Yiannis Georgiou).

The theme of this year's conference was "Argumentation and Inquiry as Venues for Civic Education". In line with the theme, many contributions opened up current research perspectives on argumentation and inquiry and specifically looked at how both can contribute to societal change and debates. The conference was well attended and brought together more than 200 researchers from both SIG20 and SIG26!






A rich scientific programme

The conference programme consisted of 10 parallel session with an average of four presentations in each session. In total over 150 contributions were presented in different formats (symposia, paper presentations, poster presentations, ICT demonstrations, and keynote speeches).

Invited Keynotes

During the conference, four keynote speeches were held by four famous scholars:

- SIG 20: Cindy Hmelo-Silver delivered a keynote on Technology-supported inquiry learning across time and space
- SIG 20: Eleni A. Kyza delivered a keynote on Learning and teaching through inquiry for responsible citizenship
- SIG 26: Robin Alexander delivered a keynote on Dialogic pedagogy in a post-truth world
- SIG 26: Hugo Mercier delivered a keynote on Evolution and development of the social functions of reason





Social events

The conference programme included also two social events, which gave the participants the opportunity to interact in a more relaxed setting. In line with the short but intense tradition of prior joint EARLI SIG 20 and SIG 26 meetings, the conference delegates had a terrific conference dinner at a beautiful location in the Judean hills on Wednesday, October 10th. In addition, on Thursday, October 11th, the conference delegates had the opportunity to participate in an exciting tour to the very unique city center of Jerusalem - holiest to all three monotheistic religions, built on four thousand years old stones and stories, beloved home to people from many different cultures.



3. Invited symposium at EARLI 2019 conference

As part of the EARLI 2019 conference, SIG20 has been invited to organise an invited symposium during this conference.

The invited symposium that will represent SIG20 will focus on "Epistemic tools for inquiry" and will be chaired by Cindy Hmelo-Silver (Indiana University Bloomington). All of the papers in the symposium will present new scaffolds designed to support students' inquiry and promote growth in inquiry competencies.

Overall, the symposium will be composed of four paper contributions on epistemic tools for inquiry bringing together researchers from four different countries as follows:

- Designing augmented reality learning technologies to support students' epistemic practices in the wild: the case of the concept mapping TraceReaders tool: *Eleni Kyza, Nicoletta Pantela, et al. (Cyprus)*
- Fostering scientific reasoning with constructive and example-based scaffolds in a modeling environment on global warming: Sarah Bichler, Marcia Linn, & Frank Fischer (Germany and US)
- Scaffolding Inquiry with Multiple Information Sources: The Knowledge Society Sandbox: Sarit Barzilai, Asnat R. Zohar, Shiri Mor-Hagani, Talia Shlomi-Elooz (Israel)
- Scaffolding Explanations and Epistemic Development for Systems (SEEDS): Joshua Danish, Cindy E. Hmelo-Silver, Ravit Golan Duncan, and Clark Chinn (US)

The discussant of the symposium will be Jim Slotta (University of Toronto).

We are looking forward to this exciting symposium and welcome all our members to attend!

4. Online members directory
