ONLINE COURSE ON PHENOMENOGRAPHY AND VARIATION THEORY

Many of the JURE participants at the 2018 conference were also taking an online course in Phenomenography and variation theory, hosted by University of Gothenburg, with Angelika Kullberg and Åke Ingerman as course leaders. The conference was the single physical meeting in the course where the participants discussed analysis in concrete terms. In total 16 PhD students passed the course, being located across the world from Vancouver in the west to Brisbane in the east, with an emphasis in Europe and Scandinavia. The course covered the key literature in the tradition during 40 years, and featured lectures by Ference Marton, Shirley Booth, Ulla Runesson and Ingrid Pramling-Samuelsson. It is planned to be offered again in 2020.

RECENT DOCTORAL THESIS

Nina Kallweit, Humboldt Universität Berlin, Germany

Children's experience of political phenomena – a phenomenographic research of children's concepts of 'war' and 'peace'. Consequences for political learning in general studies in primary school

The aim of this research project is the investigation of children's concepts of "war" and "peace" in order to generate theoretically and empirically grounded impulses for political learning on the phenomena "war" and "peace". The main goal is to make a contribution for the development of political learning in general studies in primary school. For this purpose, a research approach based on phenomenography is used. Overall, 47 pupils attending the classes 3 and 4 at schools in Berlin were interviewed by using the problem-centered interview approach (by Witzel) with phenomenographic elements.

The results of this investigation constitute the following central impulses for political learning on phenomena "war" and "peace": (I) An understanding of the phenomenon "war" in its political meaning favors an understanding of the phenomenon "peace" in its political meaning. Therefore, the phenomena should be taught together. (II) Additionally, the phenomenographic data analysis showed that it is necessary to analyze the experience of the phenomenon "war" ("by itself") and as well as the experience of the protagonists involved in the phenomenon "war" separately, so as to comprehend the experience of "war" more extensively. In this case, it is suggested that a simultaneous instruction of the phenomenon "war" ("by itself") and the protagonists, which are involved in the phenomenon "war", emphasizes and improves an understanding of "war" in its political meaning. (III) Finally, the teaching with selected pictures can be a successful approach, which gives pupils a fundamental access to an in-depth political understanding of the phenomena "war" and "peace"

Dr. Nina Kallweit was awarded the Ilse Lichtenstein-Rother Prize for her doctoral thesis in March 2018 at the 27th Annual Conference of the German Society of Interdisciplinary Science in Elementary School (Gesellschaft für Didaktik des Sachunterrichts/GDSU). **Congratulations!**

RECENT LICENTIATE THESIS

Anna Backman, University of Gothenburg, Sweden *Highlighting booktalks about shadows*

Children's books and stories are often advocated for teaching about various content in preschool. The purpose of this study is to describe how five children together with a preschool teacher talk about 'shadow' based on four children's books and in particular how shadow appears as a learning object in the booktalks. Shadow is a phenomenon that can be explained by physics, but shadow also occurs in children's books as something connected to folklore, art and fiction. An analysis based on Variation theory reveals (1.) how children experience shadow in conversation about children's books.



The result shows that the children experience shadow as affected by someone or something, visible with light and projection surface, manageable like objects, as well as self-acting with fictional abilities. The analysis also answered (2.) what is possible for children to discern of shadow as a light phenomenon in the booktalks. In the result the dimensions of variations that emerge in the booktalks reveal why visibility appears as an aspect for the children to discern and why length and placement are aspects of shadow as a light phenomenon that are not possible to discern.

This licentiate thesis is part of the Swedish National Research School on Communication and Relations as Foundations for Early Childhood Education (FoRFa).
